Class of '64



College Corner

Indiana University is located in Bloomington, Indiana, which is located just 51 miles southwest of Indianapolis. There are also 10 extensions campuses located throughout the state.

The University is composed of ten colleges and schools, including the College of Arts and Sciences, The School of Business, the School of Education, and Recreation, the Professional Schools, and the Graduate School.

During the first year in college, all students attend the Junior Division, the "freshman division" of the University. Here he receives specialized counseling and an opportunity to receive guidance on his future educational plans. After freshman year, the student may enter any of the University's schools.

Indiana University is a member of the Western Conference, the Big Ten, and participates in an inter-collegiate athletic program equal to the best. Indian U. is the twelfth largest school in the nation. It was founded in 1820. The faculty includes scholars of national and international reputation. The University Library provides more than a million publications for the use of students.

Tuition for non-residents is \$352.00 per semester. Over 1,500 undergraduate scholarships are offered each year. A Student Employment Service helps students to find part-time employment during the school year.

SAT scores are necessary for application to the University, along with a \$10. application fee. All applicants should rank in the top quarter of their class and have taken 4 years of English, and a minimum of nine units in a combination of language, science, and mathematics. Meet Mr. Brown

On July 1, 1963, a new Superintendent of the Pompton Lakes public school system, Mr. William F. Brown, took office. What is Mr. Brown really like?

He is a native New Jerseyite, having been born in Roselle Park, New Jersey. He went through the school system there, graduating from Roselle Park High School in 1931. He went on to Springfield College in Springfield, Massachusetts, where he took his Bachelor of Science Degree in 1935. He received his Masters in Education from the University of Maine in 1952. After receiving his degree from Springfield College, he went to Hastings College in Nebraska, where he taught Health and Phys. Ed., besides coaching football, basketball and track for two years. He then came back to New Jersey to become Director of Athletics and head coach, and eventually principal, for Union County Regional High School in Springfield, where he remained for 19 years.

His career at Springfield was interrupted from 1942 to 1946 when he served in the Navy with a rank of Lt. Commander. In 1956, he left Springfield and traveled to Madison, New Jersey to become Assistant Superintendent of Schools, a position he held for four years. In 1960, he returned to his hometown of Roselle Park and served as Superintendent until 1963, when he came to Pompton .

Mr. and Mrs. Brown now reside on Hill Court in Pompton Lakes. They have three children, two sons and a daughter. The oldest son recently made Mr. Brown a proud grandfather; their only daughter is a sophomore at Ithaca College; and their youngest boy will be a Senior at Pompton High this year.

Mr. Brown has expressed pleasure at the friendly greeting extended to him by the town. He sees an enjoyable future ahead and is looking forward to the opening of the school year. Besides his interest in high school sports, he enjoys fishing, hunting, golf, "generally all outdoor activities," and good music.

He hopes the faculty and Student Council can come up with a "meaningful morning exercise" to replace the Bible reading and the Lord's Prayer.


